Morgan Foothills students John Milam and Ross Arnold are taking a stronghold on their future by participating in a newly developed educational partnership between Morgan County High School, a Georgia College and Career Academy, and the Morgan Foothills Campus. Through this unique partnership, both of these exceptional students are able to participate in the Welding Dual Enrollment program offered by Athens Tech on Morgan's Career Academy campus. John and Ross, upon completion of the program, will have three college credits in the area of Shielded Metal Arc Welding, earning them a Technical College Certificate.

Partnerships such as these provide students with the chance to earn course credits toward their high school graduation, earn college credits, and participate in real world technical skills that they can use in the future. Other Dual Enrollment programming offered through this partnership include Early Childhood Education and Cosmetology.




The Ease of Foothills: Sheffield Bastow, Clarke

Staff members at Clarke who know Sheffield Bastow know him to be a self-driven, motivated student. Since enrolling in July of 2018, Sheffield has earned 11 credits at Foothills. Career Specialist Belle Rucker points out Sheffield's hard work, his respectful attitude, and the fact that he never takes a break in class.

Sheffield, though, doesn't focus on how many credits he has earned, his drive to finish classes, or even seem worried about graduating early. Instead, Sheffield says he found his way to Foothills because of the "ease"—ease of location, easy access to classes he wanted, ease of communicating with the staff. He points out that if he needs a little extra time on something, that's okay. All he has to do is

ask. Sheffield saw many advantages to coming to Foothills—advantages related to the flexibility—while not sacrificing his access to a good education.



Sheffield has enjoyed his time at Foothills, but he sees where students at Foothills sacrifice the social aspects of high school to attend. He wishes that Foothills would find a way to incorporate additional classes, maybe some with a chance for students to interact and work together. He specifically would like to see art, French, or psychology classes where students can interact with each other and a teacher.
